



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


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DIRECTORS' NOTES

"The women in this play are witty, intelligent, and above all, real characters. They in no way, shape, or form are meant to be portrayed as cartoons or caricatures." Robert Harling, Author's note.

Steel Magnolias has always been one of my favorite films. In college I had the opportunity to play Shelby in the stage production with an allfemale theatre company. It was my experience with that play and that company of women that inspired Red Magnolia Theatre Company. Directing this piece is a dream finally come true. In both the play and film, the strength of the characters, their deep friendships, and their ability to encourage and support one another through the best and worst life experiences, resonates with me. It wasn't until I met my husband (a native of Natchitoches, Louisiana, on which the small town of Chinquapin is based) the "characters" of this play became real. Playwright Robert Harling (also a Natchitoches native), based Steel Magnolias on the tragic loss of his sister, Susan Harling Robinson, his mother, Margaret, and the underlying "steel" strength and love at the heart of their female friendships. During our rehearsal process I had the chance to take a weekend road trip for a 30th Anniversary celebration of the film. I was honored to meet several women who knew the Harling family and had known Margaret (M'Lynn) and Susan (Shelby). I was struck by their stories, and how so much of their essence survives in the text. Margaret loved Jane Fonda workouts; Susan twirled fire batons. The script came alive in a new way that inspired and humbled me. I left Natchitoches with a deeper love of the material, and a profound new appreciation of the real women on which it was based. It was then, the impact of the playwright's author's note, fully resonated. If I achieved nothing else with my directorial debut I wanted make these women real. Though the play is set in the 1980's it was vitally important all elements of the production, while acknowledging the era in which it is set, feel timeless. The truth of these women, their powerful story, loving friendship, and unique personalities define the play. The film successfully achieved portraying these characters in a way that generations continue to fall in love with their friendship and story.

DIRECTORS' NOTES

In closing, I would like to note that while Robert Harling did write this play as a cathartic tribute to his sister, many often miss that his story was also to equally honor his mother Margaret, whom he deemed "The Steel Magnolia." Ours is not just "another" production of *Steel Magnolias*. "Gentle as the sweet magnolia, and stronger than steel," our production is a love story to the film that stole our hearts, the play that we treasure, and the real women on which it was based: the original "Steel Magnolias."


